ENGL 3903, Special Topics: So You Want to Be a Creative Writer?

Teacher: G. Davis

Texts Required: N/A

**Description:** During this course, students will gain understanding and experience with submitting the creative work that they have produced individually and in workshops. Students will conduct preliminary research on publication opportunities and post-graduation prospects that fit both their aesthetic tastes and professional ambitions as writers. We will also address how to find (or create) an active literary community after graduation, including applying to competitive graduate programs in creative writing.

**Major requirements for undergraduates:** multiple presentations on research findings, final portfolio, enthusiastic participation.

## ENGL 4593, Studies in Gender, Sexuality, and Literature: Biblical Figures in the Quran: Mary, Jesus, Moses, and More

Online reading of various translations of the Quran & Bible.

**Description:** Examining the Quran as literary texts, students will explore its treatment of figures and stories that are also found in the Bible, and will read scholarly analysis that examines the Quranic presentation of Adam and Eve, Joseph; Mary, and others figures, including analysis of gender in the Quran. Students will also explore the different literary style and structure of the Quran in terms of how these affect its presentations of these figures.

Essays, exams, and other major requirements for undergraduates: assignments will be designed to be suitable for a 10-day intersession course

ENGL 4603, Special Studies: History of the Book

#### **Textbooks Required:**

*The Book: A Global History*, ed. Michael F. Suarez and H. R. Woodhuysen (Oxford, 2014). 9780199679416

**Description:** This course invites students to learn and think critically about writing technologies, from cuneiform tablets to the Kindle. This course won't be like other English courses, as it will have a strong hands on element. We will be spending half of our time in the Special Collections Library, examining and studying objects from our own archive, including cuneiform, papyrus fragments, medieval manuscripts, early printed books, and all manner of later books. We will learn how writing technology affects literature and literary interpretation. Our digital age, as we will see, is only just the most recent change in reading habits and the materiality of the written word. This is the

first time in recent memory that a course like this has been taught at the University of Arkansas.

Essays, exams, and other major requirements for undergraduates: attendance; vigorous participation; one presentation; final project.
